### **Assignment requirements:**

- The exam paper must be minimum 2 900 words and maximum 4 400 words including cover page and foot- or endnotes. Reference list is not to be included in the total number of words.
- Times New Roman, font size 12, line spacing 1,5
- Have numbered pages.
- Have a cover page which specifies:
  - Total number of words
  - The course code and title
  - Which question you have chosen to answer
  - Semester and year
  - Your candidate number. **Do not write your name in your exam paper.** You will find your candidate number in studentweb
- You may write your examination paper in Norwegian, Swedish, Danish or English.
- Make sure your submission is anonymous do not use your name in your assignment or in the file name.
- You are only allowed to submit one file and it needs to be in PDF-format.

#### Use of sources and citation

- You should familiarize yourself with the rules that apply to the use of and citations.
- The answer must be in accordance with <u>practical advice for writing exam papers in social</u> anthropology.
- If you violate the rules, you may be suspected of cheating/attempted cheating.
