1 In *Death in the Afternoon* Ernest Hemingway writes:

"If a writer of prose knows enough of what he is writing about he may omit things that he knows, and the reader, if the writer is writing truly enough, will have the feeling of those things as strongly as though the writer had stated them. The dignity of the movement of an iceberg is due to only one eighth of it being above water."

Taking this quote as your starting point, discuss how the use of omissions (or ellipses) in the narrative conveys central themes or meanings in TWO OR THREE short stories on your syllabus.


2 In her essay "Defining the Short Story" Suzanne C. Ferguson observes that "impressionist settings are frequently used metaphorically to substitute for representation of action or analysis [or] the exposition of a traditional plot". Discuss the metaphorical use of setting in AT LEAST TWO stories on your syllabus.

3 Several stories on the syllabus depict an encounter between the Western and the non-Western world. Discuss how this may be regarded as a major theme in TWO OR THREE stories from your syllabus.

4 Give an interpretation of EITHER "The Embassy of Cambodia" by Zadie Smith OR "Seraglio" by Graham Swift, making sure to discuss the story's form in your analysis.
