About the course

The course provides knowledge and skills in current research methods in cognitive musicology. Current research methods will be applied to different musical elements such as melody, phrase, harmonics, instrumentation, timbre, texture, rhythm and groove, and on various topics such as emotions, expressiveness, performance, genre / style, improvisation, composition, and the interaction between sound and movement.

Learning outcome

On successful completion of the course, the students will:

- be familiar with theories and methods used in current research on musical sound in different contexts
- are able to identify and explore experientially significant features in music such as sound, harmony, movement and expressiveness
- know the basics of various approaches to computational data and music analysis
- be able to evaluate and select appropriate methods for independent research projects

Examination

Final term paper (15 pages, each containing approx. 2.300 characters, spaces not included) to be handed in by a specified deadline at the end of the semester with title and topic to be approved by the course tutor.
